ROAD HAZARDS

We have crested the peak of summer, friends. As the autumn season draws near, there are a couple home maintenance items to be aware of, as they have an impact on the rest of our friends and neighbors. When you mow your lawn near the road, grass clippings often find their way into the road where they stay. If your grass clippings find their way into the road, please sweep them back into your yard or dispose of them, as the clippings on blacktop pose a significant slipping risk for your neighbors. Motorcycles, bicycles, and even runners can slip on grass clippings leading to injury. Especially with the fall season approaching, leaves pose an equally serious danger, so please ensure your clippings and leaves are swept off the road.

Next is overgrowth over the road. There are numerous areas around our neighborhood where the vegetation from residents' yards extends into the roadway. This can cause issues with obscured vision, narrowing the roadway, and artificially restricting the vehicles moving through an area. We ask that you keep that in mind, and please trim foliage so that it does not hang into the roadway. The county can trim the roadways back if called; however, they are not likely to trim as carefully as a homeowner, so we highly recommend homeowners take the initiative and support neighborhood traffic safety.

HURRICANE SAFETY

Friends and neighbors, we have been fortunate so far this hurricane season, however we still find ourselves within its grips. Hurricane season runs from early June through the end of November and, while we typically suffer fairly minor effects during the 14 average hurricanes per year, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration estimates a record-setting 17-25 named hurricanes this year, and we want our neighbors to be prepared. When a hurricane is approaching, make sure your devices are charged and loose toys and patio furniture are secured where they may not find themselves airborne. Have an emergency kit ready, with items like flashlights, a hand-crank radio, a gallon of water per day, nonperishable food items, and additional prescription medication you may need. Remember never to cross flooded roads as the strength of just three inches of water is enough to force a vehicle off the road. And last but not least, make sure you check in on your neighbors of all ages. Let's be there for each other, and strengthen the bonds of our community, as it is together in which we find strength.
